Years with Friends

We often talk of the long and storied history that has taken place within the Keuka Outlet Ravine, from the geological features of the Devonian Period through the late 20th century when we saw its life as an industrial corridor come to an end. In April of 1984, Friends of the Outlet was formed, and for the past 35 years has been writing a new chapter in its history. Recently, community members shared some memories from the past 35 years on our Facebook page (@KeukaOutletTrail). Their stories included treasured memories shared with family and pets that are no longer with us, and some that are, as well as interactions with friendly snakes and our beloved turtles.

Not shared on Facebook was a supporter's first memory of the trail as a dump, a place where people would toss used appliances and the like. They noted that we have come a long way. While we still deal with some litter and occasional cases of vandalism or dumping, it's plain to see that our community has decided that the trail is no longer a dumping ground. It is a point of well deserved pride for our community, and a place so beautiful that it draws in visitors from all over the world.

The current state of the Keuka Outlet Trail is a testament to 35 years of community support in the form of members, volunteers, donations, grants, an all volunteer board of directors, supportive organizations, and countless people who care.

Birding Outing

Members of the Eaton Birding Society and Friends of the Outlet came together on September 14 for a walk led by Lynn Donaldson to observe the fall migration between Hopeton Road and the Pre-emption Line marker. The birds were very active and the weather was beautiful. It was an exciting highlight to see a Wood Duck lingering in a pond formed in the canal bed. We also spent some time listening to the changing song of a Carolina Wren. In addition to 27 species of birds, we were excited to see monarch butterflies, and two garter snakes entwined in a tall bush.



Cherry Street

Our partners in the Village of Penn Yan have been busy with a couple of projects to improve their portion of the trail.

In late August, All Around Excavating completed the major bank stabilization project just east of the Cherry Street entrance. Some early summer storms delayed the progress on this project, but the result is a solid, stable area protecting the trail from the potential for erosion from the outlet's water flow.

This was the last project to repair damage from the 2014 floods that was mostly paid for by Federal Emergency Management Agency funding. The village recently approved an addition of \$37,119 to the contract, bringing the project's total cost to \$349,760.

Repairs to the bank of the outlet have always been and will always be expensive, but they are important to the preservation of the Keuka Outlet Trail. The Friends of the Outlet Board of Directors are always looking for resources for other projects that will reduce the impact of erosion which threatens the trail.

We know of two areas — one near the Turtle Pond, and one between Cascade and Hopeton, where stream bank erosion is threatening the trail. We encourage everyone to be careful around the sensitive soils along the stream banks.

Cascade Millsite

Visitors to the trail have likely noticed the new fencing that has been installed around the former JT Baker buildings at the Cascade Millsite. This fencing was installed in August by a contractor hired by Arcadis, the engineering firm that monitors the site after the previous environmental clean-up projects. The Friends of the Outlet work closely with Arcadis to make the trail safe for all visitors.

Another project at the Cascade area this fall will improve the amenities for visitors. With financial support from the Yates County Legislature's Natural Resources & Recreation Grant, the Friends will build a pavilion that can be used for picnics and gatherings at that site. The materials are on hand, and we're planning construction for sometime this fall. The Friends are grateful to Norm Koek, one of our maintenance volunteers, for his leadership in this project.

Attention Hunting/Trapping

Hunting: Oct 1 - Dec 17

Hunters should use caution to ensure the safety of all trail users and

pets.

Trapping: Oct 25 - Feb 15

No Trapping is Permitted on Friends of the Outlet property.



- Wear brightly colored clothing, such as blaze orange.
- Stick to the trail.
- Let your presence be known, but be courteous to other trail users and hunters.
- Keep pets under control and ensure their safety as well.
- In some areas, the trail is bordered on one or both sides by neighboring land owners, please be respectful of their property.
